When you tell a stranger that you work in the Vegetation Management business quite often you receive a blank stare back. From there the conversation can either quickly move in another direction or you'll find yourself giving a much more sophisticated answer to explain VM, maybe something like "kill weeds with chemicals". Not exactly raising the profile of the industry... It's something that admittedly myself and probably most of you reading this have been guilty of at some point. The good news is that it is never too late to change, and move that conversation to be one that does raise the profile and awareness of the important contributions that our industry makes.

Last month I had the privilege of speaking at the Professional Vegetation Management Association annual spring meeting in Red Deer, Alberta. I guess you could say that being in the middle of Alberta it is the epicenter of the Canadian Vegetation Management business. Ron Standish, our 30+ year man in this industry, would take ALL of the credit for that if I let him. Don't get me wrong, he certainly deserves some of it, but there are a few other macro-economic reasons why Alberta tops the charts which I elaborated on to give a sense of what drives the ProVM business.

- 1) Agricultural or Productive Land Base Size
- 2) Population Size and Supporting Infrastructure
- 3) The Freedom to Operate
- 4) Land Values and Willingness to Invest in Care for that Land

Not every region will score highly on each point nor are many of these factors in our control, that's just reality. I would make the case that the freedom to operate and investment in care for our lands however, are factors in our control as an industry. Our influence comes from changing that conversation I touched on before, to raise the profile of the industry. To keep it simple, something that we can all remember are 3 key points that should enter all of those conversations we have about what we do and the value Professional Vegetation Management brings.

SAFETY: We keep workplaces and Canada's infrastructure safe.
ENVIRONMENT: We protect environments from harmful invaders.
ECONOMICS: Our vegetation control methods using herbicides are the most cost effective.

Even if the person you are having the conversation with could give a rats you know what about 2 of these points, there is a good chance that at least 1 will stick. And that will begin the process or raising the profile of an industry, one conversation at a time.

Don't be a bystander, be an educator and your opportunities will grow.


